

The Showcase is an opportunity for graduates of the Women's Enterprise Center to present their business concepts to an audience, and receive helpful feedback from a panel of successful businesswomen and community leaders.

"It's like 'Shark Tank' without the sharks," said WiNGS CEO, Jennifer Ware. "The Enterprise Showcase gives our graduates a chance to pitch their ideas and polish their presentations in a friendly, supportive environment."

- Buzzed ArtNite, a mobile paint and sip party company
- Foodology 180, a farm-to-table restaurant designed to bring healthy food options to South Dallas food
- My Puberty Party, which provides an opportunity for girls to learn about puberty in a fun, safe environment alongside their parents

The Showcase gave Enterprise Center graduate and entrepreneur, Tanasha Allwood, the chance to share her plan to expand her business, Buzzed ArtNite. "It was amazing to be here, to get over my butterflies and meet some other women who are entrepreneurs like myself and get the encouragement," said Tanasha Allwood, presenter and owner of Buzzed ArtNite.

This month marks two years since moving into our women's center, now known as the WiNGS Center at Ebby's Place. During those early weeks at the Center, our team spent time thoughtfully crafting the member experience. One of their first decisions,

in fact, was to shift our language from "clients" to "members", reinforcing the message that the WiNGS Center belongs to the women in our community who turn to us for guidance. We launched the Women's Enterprise Center, providing tools, resources, and, more importantly, peer support for women ready to grow or start a business.

Over the course of the last two years, we've reached over 6,000 women - not all at the Center - but all with our same philosophy to give them the support and confidence to overcome the obstacles in their path. Our commitment is to the women in our community who struggle to get by. To feed their kids. To live in safety. To avoid disaster, day after day.

The women we serve know that a better life exists. They are not looking for luxury. They want stability, security and independence. They want the freedom to make choices and take risks. They want to know they can pay their bills every month, and be prepared for the unexpected. They want to give their kids a solid foundation, and to make them proud.

Meet our Volunteer of the Year: Cheryl Barnes



Throughout her banking career,
Cheryl Barnes has seen how a lack
of financial education can lead to
disaster. She's watched as a young
woman who added her boyfriend
to her checking account as an act
of love saw her account emptied
after an argument. She's seen

an elderly couple lose most of their life savings to a manipulative nursing home employee. She's taught a widow who had never managed her own money, or even owned a checking account, to handle her finances after her husband's death.

Cheryl's employer, Mutual of Omaha, encourages their staff to become involved in the community.

When she and her team were looking for volunteer opportunities, the chance to teach financial

education to women seemed like a perfect fit. "I was lucky enough to have had a strong role model in my mother who showed me that a woman was able to handle her own finances and not give away her power to others, so I was able to help my clients to understand this as well," said Cheryl.

Cheryl has served our members and partner agencies as a Rise facilitator, a Tax Credit Educator, and a budget coach for nearly seven years. "Each time I partner with WiNGS I feel I that I take away more than I am able to give," Cheryl said. "I don't think I could ask for anything more."

Cheryl is the 2017 recipient of the Ebby Halliday
Volunteer of the Year Award, and will be honored at the
WiNGS Mentors & Allies Luncheon on May 1.
